21	WHEREAS,	youth across the city are committing acts of violence against one another and	
22		throughout their communities; and

24	WHEREAS,	violence is defined as "the intentional use of physical force or power, threatened or	
25 26		actual, against oneself, another person, or against a group or community, which either results in or has a high likelihood of resulting in injury, death, psychological	
20 27		harm, maldevelopment, or deprivation; and

29	WHEREAS,	the Center for Disease Control reports that many people survive violence and are	
30	,	left with permanent physical and emotional scars, and that violence erodes	
31		communities by reducing productivity, decreasing property values, and disrupting

34	WHEREAS,	in 1985, former United States Surgeon General C. Everett Koop declared violence	
35		as a public health issue and called for the application of the science of public health	
36 37		to the treatment and prevention of violence; and	
38	WHEREAS	an individual's characteristics, experiences, and environmental conditions during	
39	, illinerio,	childhood and adolescence are an indicator of future violent behavior; and

41	WHEREAS,	ages 15 through 18, the ages that students spend in high school, are the peak years	
42	,	of offending; and

44	WHEREAS,	there is concern about high school dropout rates, academic performance, and	
45		violence in schools across this city based on what happens in city neighborhoods;

2	WHEREAS,	the homicide rate among Black male youths between 10 and 25 years old is nearly
3		20 times higher than the rate among White male youths; and
4		
5	WHEREAS,	due to the violence epidemic, youth suffer from either primary or secondary trauma.
6		Primary trauma is trauma associated with the violent death of a loved one.
7		Secondary trauma results from exposure to violence present within their
8		community; and

10 11	WHEKEAS,	exposure to violence in families and communities, as well as exposure to homicidal death, can lead to youth-specific post-traumatic stress disorder with complex
12		effects as well as homicidal grief; and

14	WHEREAS.	trauma is not easily visible within youth because it requires proper assessment and,
15	,	due to the amount of violence youth are currently exposed to, measures should be
16		taken to properly assess the issue; and

18	WHEREAS,	a trauma-informed approach suggests that violence is not symptomatic of bad
19		people but, rather, is a negative health outcome resulting from exposure to
20		numerous risk factors. The public health approach to violence focuses on
21		prevention through addressing the known factors that increase or decrease the
22 23		likelihood of violence; and
23 24	WHEREAS	the experience of trauma impacts children of all situations and conditions across
