A. Update from the Mayor

Mayor Gavin Buckley City Council Remarks 7 p.m. 27 March 2023 City Council Chambers

Good evening!

Last week, I met with members of Governor Moore's team, to outline City of Annapolis priorities for consideration in the Maryland state budget. It was a great meeting and they were excited to see and learn about all the critical resiliency, equity, access and mobility projects we are working to deliver in the next three years.

I truly appreciate the openness and partnership with which Gov. Moore and his staff are engaging with the City. I look forward to the continuation of these conversations - with Governor Moore and his team, with new Cabinet Secretaries, and with all our State and Federal partners - to keep building understanding and support, including funding support, that we will need to deliver these ambitious projects.

Governor Moore has spoken frequently about his determination that Maryland will set the pace when it comes to resiliency, jobs and the economy. Annapolis is ready to do its part through policies, (like our commitment to sustainable, electric mobility options) and projects (like our re-imagined City Dock) that will position our city, and our state to lead. She is the 25th president of this three-centuries old college - and the first woman. St John's is very lucky to have a scholar and leader as experienced and talented as President Demleitner and I look forward to building an even closer relationship with St John's under her leadership.

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On Saturday, we will celebrate the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Parade and African Diaspora Festival in Annapolis. The parade will start at noon just below Westgate Circle. It will travel down West Street to Main Street to City Dock where the festival will take place. I will be marching in the Parade, along with some of my Council and City colleagues. I hope to see you there!

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Lastly, I want to give a quick reminder that City offices will be closed in observance of Spring religious holidays. The Pip Moyer Center will be open on Good Friday but closed on Easter Sunday. Trash and recycling pickups will not change. Happy Easter and Happy Passover to all who celebrate!

WHEREAS, The City of Annapolis authorizes annual City events and other special

events throughout the year; and

WHEREAS, Title 6 § 04.21 states that the City can charge fees for use of City facilities such as public spaces, grounds, parks and docks and for City services which include traffic control, crowd control, security, public safety support (police or fire), trash removal, and sanitary services; and WHEREAS, Title 14 § 18.110 allows the City Council to exempt special events, which include "City-supported" events defined in Title 14 § 18.020, from City facilities and services fees; and

WHEREAS, Title 6 § 04.210(D)(4) further states that the City Council authorizes the

fee waiver the fees by resolution;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE ANNAPOLIS CITY COUNCIL that, in recognition of their significance to our heritage and public service to our City, the following are "City-supported" events during Fiscal Year 2024 (in order of occurrence during the fiscal year):

- Elk's Pre-Labor Day Parade (September)
- Kunta Kinte Festival (September)
- Tug of War (November)
- Veterans Day Ceremony (November)
- Grand Illumination (November)
- Annapolis Holiday Market (December)

- Lights Parade (December)
- St. Patrick's Day Parade Weekend Events: St. Patrick's Day Parade, Hooley and Shamrock the Dock (March)
- Martin Luther King, Jr. Parade and Diaspora Concert and Festival (April)
- Annapolis Pride Parade and Festival (June)
- Juneteenth Parade and Festival (June)

AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED BY THE ANNAPOLIS CITY COUNCIL that the following are annual City events for Fiscal Year 2024 (in order of occurrence during the fiscal year):
