

Museum-On-A-Move GOALS & OUTCOMES

As a transformative culmination, 30 students and 7 chaperones will embark on an unforgettable journey to Charleston, S.C. immersing themselves in the historical tapestry, savoring the vibrant present and reimagining their futures.

Project Goal(s):

1. Provide an opportunity for youth to immerse themselves in a different culture through the exploration of local customs, traditions, language and way of life.
2. Promote the importance of the preservation of African American History and Culture
3. Provide opportunities to research and explore cultural and historical connections between Annapolis, MD and Charleston, SC (2 major sites of Black history and culture)

Project Outcome:

- **Personal Growth & Education:** Instill a deeper understanding and appreciation of African American history, which can serve as a foundation for personal growth, cultural awareness and social engagement.
- **Dialogue & Discourse:** Students will lead a panel discussion at the 2024 Maryland Commission on African American History and Culture's Civil Rights History Symposium at Morgan State University to share their experience and discoveries with the public.

TRIP DETAILS 3 nights & 4 days in Charleston, S.C.



- Site Visits include the International African American Museum, Fort Sumter National Monument; The Battery; The Slave Mart & more!
- Students will engage in an interactive community service project with the Gullah-Geechee youth of James Island, S.C. The Gullah-Geechee culture is an important part of the African American heritage in the Lowcountry region of South Carolina.
