## **Proposed Parking Meter Rate Reduction - Fiscal Note**

With the proposed City Council action of reducing the City's parking meter rates to \$1/hr from January 1 to March 30, there would be an associated budget amendment required to account for the reduction in projected revenues.

At the end of July, 2013, the parking meter rates were increased to \$2/hr as part of the City's upgrade in parking meter equipment. The FY2014 Parking Fund budget projected \$1,604,011 from the on-street parking meters. To date through November, 2013, the parking meter revenues are:

The impact of the proposed reduction in parking meter rates can be seen in the tables above. This impact is based upon actual revenue from January to March in 2013 and the revenue growth since the end of July when the rate increase took effect.

From August through November, parking meter revenue increased over FY2013 by 81%, on track to meet the FY2014 budget (95.52% with the month of July not being at the new rate). Assuming a similar growth across all months, the revenue shortfall would be approximately \$135,822.34 during those three months of reduced fees.
