

RESUME FOR ELLEN O MOYER

In 2010, Ellen Moyer capped 50 years of public service as a community activist, elected Alderman and Mayor. From 2001 to 2009, Ellen served as the CEO and first women Mayor in 300 years in Maryland's Capital City, Annapolis.

Selected three times as one of Maryland's most influential women by The Daily Record, Ellen has been recognized as a leader and innovator and for initiatives to enhance community quality of life. Among her numerous awards are recognition by Pennsylvania State University Board of Trustees as a Distinguished Alumni; the naming of the Ellen O Moyer Nature Park on Back Creek for environmental initiatives and action; the City's first Living Landmarks Award for achievements and leadership in preserving and enhancing the communities Cultural Heritage; the first award for introducing the Kids of Hope education program; a State Tourism Award for creation of the Worcester County Horse History Trail; the Arts Council Annie Award for Lifetime Achievement in the Arts; the Legacy Award for vision and advocacy of the Annapolis Maritime Museum; the Towson High School Hall of Fame and the naming of the City Hall Art Gallery, she founded in 2002, in her honor for initiatives in the Arts.

During her tenure as an elected official, she moved the City of Annapolis to embrace an environmental ethic through a new Department of the Environment and Neighborhood Protection (DNEP) that culminated in 2009 with the Nation's first International Livable City Award. Through her initiatives the City obtained a 42% urban tree canopy; a unique Urban Public Land Trust; an award winning Park and Paths for People Plan with 21 street-end parks; Greenscape, an annual beautification volunteer program; an aggressive storm water management program with a nickel-a-day for the Bay fee for clean water; the first municipal watershed plan in Maryland and a community based Let's Talk program in preparation for the city Comprehensive Land Use Plan completed in 2009.

Elected in the Democratic Primary on the eve of 9/11 she moved the City through its first emergency operations program; enhanced public safety by moving the Police Department into one of the top city units in the State; and achieved an AA+ bond rating, the first, for the City of Annapolis.

Ellen served five Governors on a variety of Boards and Commissions including the State Board of Education, The State Racing Commission and the Local Government Advisory Council to the Chesapeake Bay Program. As part of a National Program she served on the Maryland State Team to develop opportunity for Gifted and Talented Students in the public education system. In the 1970's, as Executive Director for the Maryland Commission for Women, she help to organize Maryland's Domestic Abuse Program and to achieve credit status for women. Trained by Vice President Al Gore on Climate Change, Ellen Moyer was selected as one of fifty Mayors to participate in National Forums at Sundance, Utah to enhance causes for the environment.

Ellen is a co-founder and initiator of Maryland Hall for the Creative Arts in 1970's and the Annapolis Summer Garden Theatre in the 1960,s. Murals, artwork and history panels in Annapolis are a result of her initiative establishing the Art in Public Places Commission in 2000.

Engaged in writing, her articles on the environment, history, and horseracing appear in local magazines. She is the principal author of the column ‘What do you think’ in Whats Up Magazine, Historic Horse Trails Worcester County, and the author of two publications, “Memories, the THS Class of 1954” and “Art in the City of Annapolis, an art gallery without walls”.
