22	<b>FOR</b> the purpose of accepting and approving the recommendation of the Historic Preservation
23	Commission to designate the Community Health Center at Parole, Inc. as a landmark;

26	WHEREAS, the Community Health Center at Parole, Inc. has submitted a request for
27	Determination of Eligibility for Landmarking to the Historic Preservation
28	Commission for the Community Health Center at Parole; and
29	Commission for the Community frequence at Faroto, and
30	WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 21.56.030C of the Annapolis City Code "[t]he Historic
31	Preservation Commission may, after making a full and proper study, recommend
32	any area within the limits of the City for designation as a landmark, site, structure,
33	or district of historic, cultural, archaeological, or architectural significance;" and
34	
35	WHEREAS, such recommendations for designation of landmarks, sites, structures and districts
36	shall be submitted to the City Council for consideration; and
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38	WHEREAS, Section 21.56.030B authorizes the City Council to designate boundaries for
39	landmarks, sites, structures, or districts of historic, cultural, archaeological, or
40	architectural significance within the City limits; and
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42	WHEREAS, the staff of the Historic Preservation Division of the City of Annapolis Planning
43	and Zoning Department, uses the standardized system for determining historical
44	significance as established by the United States Department of the Interior's
45	National Park Service; and
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1 WHEREAS, the Chief of Historic Preservation is qualified under the Secretary of the Interior's 2 Standards and Guidelines for Professional Qualification (36 C.F.R. Part 61) to conduct an analysis of the resource and to provide guidance to the Historic 3 4 Preservation Commission; and 5 6 WHEREAS, the resource must meet one of the four criteria for designation; and 7 8 WHEREAS, the resource has been evaluated in consideration of the association with important 9 historical context and retention of historic integrity of those features necessary to 10 convey its significance; and 11 WHEREAS, the attributes of the resource have been evaluated using seven aspects of integrity 12 (location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association); and 13 14 WHEREAS, the Community Health Center at Parole resource meets local landmark criteria by 15 being associated with the broad patterns of Annapolis history, specifically for its 16 contribution to improving health care services for the African-American 17 community, both during its historic period when quality health care for African-18 American women and children was lacking and more recently as it expanded the 19 facility and services to meet the needs of a growing community of Latino families; 20 21 and 22 23 WHEREAS, the Community Health Center at Parole also meets the local landmark criteria by being associated with the lives of significant persons in the history of Annapolis, 24 which include Walter S. Mills, Reverend John T. Chambers Sr., James Marchand 25 and France America Pindell; and 26 27 WHEREAS, Walter S. Mills, an educator and principal at Parole Elementary School for 46 28 29 years, successfully sued the Anne Arundel County Board of Education in 1939 with representation by Thurgood Marshall to establish the principle of equal pay for 30 African American teachers and principals; and 31 32 33 WHEREAS, Reverend John T. Chambers, Sr. owned and operated Chambers Barber Shop at West Washington Street and West Street from the 1940s thru 1975, served as 34 President of the Anne Arundel County Federation of Parents and Teachers, 35 President of the Anne Arundel Chapter of the National Association for the 36 Advancement of Colored People, was on the Board of the Citizens Planning and 37 Housing Association, and President of the Parole Elementary School PTA; and 38 39 40 WHEREAS, James Marchand served as the construction manager for the building of the original Community Health Center at Parole, and was employed as the building trades 41 instructor at Wiley H. Bates High School, training hundreds of African-American 42 students and veterans in such fields as bricklaying, carpentry, electrical and 43 plumbing as they returned from World War II service and were acquiring their high 44

school diplomas as a result of the GI Bill and

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1	WHEREAS, France America Pindell was the owner of Pindell and Pindell Contracting, served
2	as a trustee for the Mt. Olive African Methodist Episcopal Church for over five
3	decades, was a board member and President of Community Health Center at
4	Parole, Inc. from 1984-1998, and initiated, and served as Project Manager for, the
5	renovation and expansion of the Community Health Center at Parole in 2002; and
6 7	WHEREAS, these individuals demonstrated extraordinary leadership in funding, administering
8	and building this community institution; and
9	and building and boilinging institution, and
10	WHEREAS, the Community Health Center at Parole was the first health center in Maryland
11	financed entirely by the African American community, and
12	
13	WHEREAS, the Community Health Center at Parole is historically and culturally significant to
14	the history of health care in the African American community in Annapolis; and
15	
16	WHEREAS, the Community Health Center at Parole maintains to a significant degree the
17	aspects of integrity associated with its historical and cultural significance; and
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19	WHEREAS, the Historic Preservation Commission voted unanimously on September 22, 2016
20	that the Community Health Center at Parole fulfills the criteria to be designated a
21	local historic landmark and therefore forwards its recommendation to this effect to
22	the City Council; and
