

## Office of Emergency Management History



Early 2000's through 2004 the Office of Domestic Preparedness resided in APD.

The Office of Domestic Preparedness was a precursor to the current Office of Emergency Management.

APD Police Lieutenant Gary Simpson served as the Commander of the Office of Domestic Preparedness Unit.

## Office of Emergency Management History



In 2010, under Mayor Josh Cohen, OEM went into the Annapolis Fire Department. Then, Deputy Fire Chief Kevin Simmons became Director.

In 2012, OEM took on Risk Management duties and a name change:

Emergency Preparedness and Risk Management (EPARM)

In 2014, the Mayor Mike Pantelides administration relieved EPARM of Risk Management duties. Went back to OEM designation.

## Office of Emergency Management History



In 2019, the Annapolis City Council voted unanimously to create the Office of Emergency Management Department, a stand alone City Department.

Former Deputy Fire Chief Kevin J. Simmons named as Director.





 Emergency Management has been awarded a total of \$6,489,273.91 in federal and state grant funding for the Compromise Street pumping station project that Public Works is developing.

#### Major City Dock grant applications include:

- January 2021: \$1.75M grant application to the Economic Development Administration (EDA) of the U.S. Commerce Department (denied)
- February 2022: \$3M to the Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE), (submitted and pending review)
- February 2022: \$5M to the MDE (submitted and pending review)
- March 2022: \$3.19M grant application to the EDA (submitted and pending review) Spring 2022: \$15-30M to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (in development)

### City of Annapolis Hazard Mitigation Plan



• The Plan's purpose is to reduce the loss of life and property, human suffering, economic disruption and disaster assistance costs resulting from natural disasters.



- The Plan analyzes the risks of various natural hazards and prioritizes mitigation actions to prevent future losses.
- Emergency Management updates the Plan every five years. The current plan expires on March 18, 2023. OEM has secured a FEMA grant through the FY20 Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) Grant Program to update this plan.
- Bottom Line: OEM maintains this Plan using grants at no cost to the City which enables eligibility for larger amounts of grant funding, such as the recent \$3.4M FEMA grant for Compromise Street and Public Assistance funding after a disaster.

## How Homeland Security Grants Help Public Safety



The Homeland Security Grants assist the City of Annapolis in preventing, protecting, mitigating, responding and recovering from acts of terrorism and other threats. These grants, covering about 80 active project numbers in MUNIS, fund a range of preparedness activities that help the City plan, purchase equipment, train, exercise, and manage City resources.

These Homeland Security Grants, which on average total about \$1M per fiscal year, save the city tons of money on major expenses across all of the Departments. The amount of money awarded in grants is more than Emergency

Management costs the City.

- MDEM compiled City of Annapolis, Anne Arundel County, and Cecil County impact statements to request a Presidential Disaster Declaration.
- Received support from the Maryland Congressional Delegation. •


• Worked with MDEM to then request an SBA Disaster Declaration which was granted.

 Formed Action Committee of Annapolis, AACo, and District 30a officials to petition Governor Hogan and the Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) to activate State disaster relief programs.

• Gov. Hogan directed \$4 million to activate DHCD disaster programs.







### Severe Coastal Flooding - October 2021




- Fourth highest flooding incident in City's recorded history.
- Flood levels extended over a 48 hour period.





- Extensive road closures in the downtown and Eastport areas.
- Significant water damage to the Annapolis



- 11 commercial businesses surveyed with some minor physical damage.
- Heavy economic loss to businesses during busy Halloween weekend.

 The proposed legislation calls for the SMWOB account to expand eligibility of certain State grants when a local state of emergency is declared without a state

deceleration.

 The bills also include provisions which would allow for nonprofit organizations to be included in the eligibility of



these grants which they are currently restricted from.

OEM provided written testimony to the MGA testifying in support of both bills.

The bills are currently moving through committee and are expected to receive a favorable recommendation.





## **Dam 135**




The City of Annapolis is required to exercise the Dam 135 Emergency Action Plan whenever there are changes made to the plan.


OEM will facilitate a tabletop exercise in partnership with Public Works.

## Annapolis Call Center Training

The JIC (Joint Information Center) is an essential part of the Emergency Operations Center. When the JIC is activated, volunteers are called to the the EOC. These volunteers consist of employees and members of the general public. These volunteers help to reduce the amount of calls received by police dispatch.

In October of 2020, OEM held a Call Taker refresher for those who signed up as volunteers. Volunteers answered mock calls and responded to the "constituents" appropriately.




## Emergency Operations Plan



The Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) is the backbone of the City's response to an emergency. The EOP contains information on how the City will respond to emergencies in various capacities.

This plan was last updated in 2020. Due to the pandemic, we were unable to exercise it when it was finalized. On December 10, 2021 we held our citywide exercise and EOP review. Directors and stakeholders from all departments were in the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) being briefed on updates to the plan.



## Incident Command System (ICS)



Homeland Security Presidential Directive 5 (HSPD-5)

After the attacks on September 11, 2001, President George W. Bush issued HSPD-5 in February 2003.

HSPD-5 established a National Incident Management System (NIMS) to identify steps for improved coordination between federal, state, and local government and described how these agencies will prepare for such a response.

NIMS requires the use of ICS.

NIMS requires the adoption if ICS as a condition of receiving Federal preparedness funding.



## Winter Relief Program at Stanton Center

- Mission: "Nobody dies from exposure on the streets of Annapolis" o Provide emergency temporary warming relief to community members who need this service
  - Connect referrals to health services through the office of Community Services and Crisis Response
- Standards:
  - Meals: Dinner, Breakfast
  - Cot to sleep on with blankets and

## Winter Relief Program at Stanton Center



#### OEM's partnership with the Lighthouse Shelter:

- In FY22 the operating budget allowed for \$7,950.00 which allows for the Stanton Center to open about 46 nights during the winter season.
- Additionally, Lighthouse shelter partnered with the City of Annapolis providing up to an additional \$15,000.00.
  - This allowed the City to open up at 32 degrees (with windchill) as opposed to 25 degrees (with windchill).

- With this additional money the warming center was able to open an additional 38 times to date (original budget allowed for 46 openings)
- For FY23, OEM has requested additional funds in the operating budget that will give the Winter Relief a budget of \$16,000 to help keep up operations at this rate.

### Substance Use Disorder - ODFree Dashboard



- •31.8% in all overdose incidents (198 v 135).
- overdose numbers in the past 6 years (2016 = 122).
- •39.3% in fatal overdose incidents 2020 (28) v 2021 (17).
- Heroin/Opioid saw a 17.9% decrease in the cause of an overdose (139 v 110). •
- Wards 1, 2, 5, and 6 had at least a 36% decrease in ODs with Wards 1 & 2 decreasing by at least 58%.
- •Black males over 50 saw a significant decrease of 58.3% in Non-Fatal overdoses compared to 2020 (36 vs 15).
- Naloxone administration by citizens increased per incident showing their comfort in and access to Narcan. 2020 = 46% of ODs vs 2021 = 60% of ODs





## BUSINESS RECOVERY
