### A. Update from the Mayor

Mayor Gavin Buckley City Council Remarks 14 November 2022 - 1:30 p.m. City Council Chamber

Good evening everyone.

Earlier today, Sen. Chris VanHollen, Congressman John Sarbanes, County Executive Steuart Pittman, State Sen. Sarah Elfreth, and local leaders came together at Burtis House at City Dock to announce the Chesapeake Gateway Recreation Area.

The idea is a National Park Service administered recreation area similar to Golden Gate Recreation Area and Boston Harbor Islands Recreation Area that will highlight cultural and historic sites within the Chesapeake Bay watershed.

These sites may include Burtis House, Thomas Shoal Point Lighthouse, Elktonia/Carr's Beach, Whitehall Manor, and Fort Monroe, among others. Where once we were all competing for federal dollars, we may see dedicated funding in our future to make the infrastructure enhancements that will not only preserve these sites, but create a way for the public to seamlessly engage with them.

I thank our federal, state and county partners. This idea has been around for some 40 years. It was studied 20 years ago and deemed to be a workable plan and now - due to great partnerships - we get to see it coming to fruition.

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It is Thanksgiving next Thursday. I'd like to wish all of our residents a happy celebration with family and friends. As a reminder, city offices are closed on both Thursday and Friday.

Thanksgiving is also a great time to think of others. The City is supporting turkey drives through the Office of Community Services and the Food Friday program. Follow us on social media to learn about ways you can help.

The Annapolis Police Department continues to collect food items to provide Thanksgiving meals to local families. They're looking for five pound bags of potatoes, bags of onions, canned and jarred foods, and bags or boxes of stuffing, pasta and healthy snacks. The collection box is open at 199 Taylor Avenue until Wednesday, Nov. 16.

If you plan to head out for holiday shopping the day after Thanksgiving, make sure you include shopping local in your plans. Small businesses in all corners of the City - historic downtown, West Annapolis, Parole, Forest Drive - have shown their commitment to our community time and again. I hope you will take the time this holiday season to reward them with your business.

The day after Thanksgiving isn't your only chance! Midnight Madness is back three Thursdays in a row: Dec. 1, 8 and 15. Shop downtown - which will be

spectacularly lit up and ready for your family and friends to create some special holiday memories.

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On Thursday, December 1 from 4 to 6 p.m., stop by our City Hall Open House before heading out to the first night of Midnight Madness. It's open to the public and right here in City Council Chambers. We'll have refreshments and entertainment.

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One final note about our plans to make holiday shopping as easy as possible. We're activating our holiday parking program, that's three hours free parking at metered locations in downtown between Thanksgiving and New Years. The three hour limit is enforced, so if you plan on staying longer, please park at one of our City garages.

A reminder that residential spaces in the historic district are now reserved for residents who hold a parking pass or can be paid through ParkMobile.

Parking at Park Place is a good option with the free downtown "magenta" shuttle running every 5 to 8 minutes. Visit www.accessannapolis.com to learn more about parking options in downtown, including locations of free garages nights and weekends.

These parking options join Annapolis Go! And our Bird e-bikes and scooters. Choose the way that works for you.

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The Office of Emergency Management has two notices they would like me to pass along: first, the health department has added flu shots to the Thursday vaccination clinics at Pip Moyer. That's from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. either walk-in or appointment. Visit the Anne Arundel County Department of Health for details and to schedule your covid and/or flu vaccine.

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Lastly, we are expecting our first freeze overnight from Friday into Saturday. When the forecast calls for temperatures below 32 degrees, OEM activates the Warming Relief Program. Please check in with the OEM social media pages for details, and please check in on elderly neighbors and family members.

Notes - For the purpose of authorizing and empowering the City of Annapolis (the "City") to issue and sell, upon its full faith and credit, (i) one or more series of its general obligation bonds in the aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$26,000,000 (the "Bonds"), pursuant to Sections 19-301 through 19-309, inclusive, of the Local Government Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland, as amended, and Article VII, Section 11 of the Charter of the City of Annapolis, as amended (the "Charter") and (ii) one or more series of its general obligation bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance of the Bonds in the maximum aggregate principal amount equal to the maximum aggregate principal amount of the Bonds (the "Notes"), pursuant to Sections 19-211 through 19-221, inclusive, of the Local Government Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland, as amended, and the Charter; providing that the Bonds and Notes shall be issued and sold to finance and refinance certain public purposes of the City as provided in this Ordinance; prescribing the form and tenor of the Bonds and Notes; providing for the method of sale of the Bonds and Notes and other matters relating to the issuance and sale thereof; providing for the disbursement of the proceeds of the Bonds and Notes; covenanting to levy and collect all taxes necessary to provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds and Notes; and generally providing for and determining various matters relating to the issuance, sale and delivery of the Bonds and Notes.
