A1. Problem Identification: (Describe the problem to be addressed, needs assessment, etc.)

The City of Annapolis jurisdiction is uniquely located as the Capital of the State of Maryland, Seat of Anna Arundel County and home of the United States Naval Academy. Inherent to the concerns of terrorism and unrest, the City of Annapolis Fire and Emergency Medical Services as prepared by the State of Maryland Guidance to First Responders must be prepared to respond in support of Active Assailant Incidents. As per Healthcare Preparedness Capabilities we need to enhance our Responder Health and Safety to ensure our personnel are able to quickly triage, treat and evacuate victims in or near an Active Shooter/Mass Casualty Incident. This includes providing Fire and EMS teams with proper Ballistic Protective Equipment as well as detailed training to support this critical capability. Recent expert analysis of these types of incidents has revealed that having medical and rescue personnel who are properly trained and equipped enter the scene while it is ongoing greatly maximizes victim survival.

A2. Project Description (Describe the problems to be addressed)

The City of Annapolis Fire and Emergency Medical Services needs to purchase the Ballistic Protective Equipment for our personnel to wear before entering an unsecured Active Assailant incident. This is referred to as a warm or hot zone. We would need to develop a detailed Operating Policy Manual Section to outline the procedures as well as supply our personnel with Tactical Vests, Tactical Helmets and Tactical Response Kits as allowed in the DHS Authorized Equipment List (AEL).

The Department is currently working with local Annapolis Police as well as surrounding jurisdictions to complete a Standard Operating Procedure for response to these types of incidents.

At this time we do not have the budget required to purchase the Ballistic Protective Equipment.

A3. Project Objectives (Identify how objectives reference Governor's Core Goals for Homeland Security)

The Active Assailant Incident would potentially fall under two of the Governor's Core Goals.

First it is Personal Protective Equipment for First Responders to ensure the safety of our personnel who respond to these incidents

Secondly it potentially could be a Mass Casualty Incident.

FEMA also encourages first responder agencies to develop The Active Assailant Program.

Article I - Summary Description of Award

The FY 2014 HSGP plays an important role in the implementation of the National Preparedness System (NPS) by supporting the building, sustainment, and delivery of core capabilities essential to achieving the National Preparedness Goal of a secure and resilient Nation. HSGP funding shall be used for statutorily eligible costs related to the planning, organization, equipment, training, and exercise needs that prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from acts of terrorism and other catastrophic events. This HSGP award consists of State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) funding in the amount of \$6,125,000 and Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) funding in the amount of \$5,500,000. These programs provide an integrated mechanism that builds and sustains core capabilities to support the Nation's Preparedness against terrorist attacks, major disasters and other emergencies.

Article XI - Federal Debt Status

All recipients are required to be non-delinquent in their repayment of any Federal debt. Examples of relevant debt include delinquent payroll and other taxes, audit disallowances, and benefit overpayments. See OMB Circular A-129 and form SF-424B, item number 17 for additional information and guidance.

Article XII - Fly America Act of 1974
