The Schenectady Urban Cultural Park is a cultural resource management agency within the City Department of Development that uses education, recreation, historic preservation, and economic development projects to revitalize and enhance the city's urban core. It is one of the original "urban cultural parks", now Heritage Areas, within the New York State Heritage Area System, managed by the Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation. All projects involved multiple partnerships.
