Non-Discrimination of Foreign-Born Residents

Staff Report

This legislation will amend the Code of the City of Annapolis by extending equal rights and protections to foreign-born residents, while acknowledging equal rights for all individuals. This legislation also seeks to recognize the importance of accommodating culturally diverse contributions of foreign-born residents to social, religious, cultural, and economic life in Annapolis.

The Code amendments will encompass the addition of a new Chapter 3.50 with Sections setting forth definitions, prohibited conduct, and penalty provisions.

The legislation is premised on the following factors:

- 1. The City of Annapolis has a culturally diverse population that includes many foreign-born residents.
- 2. In particular, Hispanic and Latino populations are growing at a steady rate in the City of Annapolis and throughout the State of Maryland, rendering issues pertaining to foreign-born populations of ongoing importance to local and state government.
- 3. The Governor's Commission of Hispanic Affairs 2013 Annual Report indicates that Maryland's Hispanic population has increased by 35% since 2008.
- 4. It is the mission of the City of Annapolis to promote public trust in its government agencies and in its enforcement of laws.
- 5. The City of Annapolis encourages all individuals to report crimes to City law enforcement officials.
- 6. The United States Constitution vests in the Federal government the authority to enact laws governing which foreign-born residents are granted entrance into the United States and determining who among them may stay.
