
The City Council adopted the City Dock Master Plan in 2013

Like historic buildings and districts, these places reveal aspects of our origins and development through their form and features and the ways they were used.





- Provide the necessary philosophical framework for a consistent and holistic approach








Rehabilitation



- Applies in diverse situations to a range of resources
- Allows for adaptive uses
- Does not require restoration to a particular period of time (1695–1942)
- Appropriate when alterations or additions to the property are planned for a new or continued use

City Dock Evolution

1700s.

The shoreline followed approximately along the line of the buildings that front Dock Street.

Market Space, and part of Compromise Street.


Nicholson's 1695 baroque town plan

Late 1800s:

Both sides of Market Slip had been filled in to their present shoreline from Craig Street to the head of the waterway.




Early 1900s: The original cove is paved and formalized as surface parking.

- Existing Condition

- Treatment Approaches



Treatment Approaches

- Maintain City Dock as the City's most significant open space
- Maintain the historic visual and physical relationship of land to water articulated by Nicholson's plan.
- Consider how the built environment and natural systems intersect at City Dock and how the City can adapt the landscape to accommodate Sea Level Rise.
- Initiate a community dialogue based on how the cultural landscape might incorporate both commemoration and interpretation, particularly regarding the history of race on this site, the African slave trade, maritime history, exclusion and inclusion, and religious conflict and toleration.
- Increase and foster economic development in the greater downtown in a truly inclusive manner
- Provide substantial opportunities for continued interpretation and equitable memorialization in a thriving waterfront mixed use area
