Summary

Kurt Riegel is a scientist/manager/executive with experience in research, teaching, policy development and implementation, science and technology program and facilities management, and executive leadership in government agencies and in nonprofit organizations. His most recent work has had an environmental focus, in universities, government agencies, and in nonprofit organizations.

He led energy research, policy development, and regulatory programs at the Department of Energy, and was a technical project manager. He directed environmental technology development and deployment programs at the Environmental Protection Agency through awarded grants, contracts and supervision of programs at federal laboratories. At the National Science Foundation, he headed the National Astronomy Centers. At the Department of Navy, he was the founding director of the Naval Sea Systems Command's environmental protection program, and was the Department's Director for Environmental Technology.

He now lives in Annapolis and has directed his professional energies to local environmental problems, particularly of Annapolis, the Chesapeake Bay, its tributaries, and watersheds. Other civic and environmental activities have included serving on the Severn River Commission and the Annapolis Environmental Commission. He has been board member and president of the Severn River Association, and board member and vice-president of the West Annapolis Civic Association.

He teaches a graduate level course in environmental compliance management at the Johns Hopkins University, and has been a consultant to the Antares Group on energy efficiency and renewable energy.

Additional Remarks Relevant to Annapolis

Kurt Riegel sees an urgent need for the city of Annapolis to mount and execute the following environmental efforts, and will devote his energies to assisting and coordinating those who must play a role in accomplishing them:

- Prepare an updated assessment of the city's environmental obligations and opportunities
- Identify each department of government, and other parties, that must be recruited to address them
- Create a plan for achieving progress, with schedule and costs
- Secure commitments that incorporate them into the core mission of each department or organization
- See that resources necessary for execution are assembled and allocated
- At every stage of the above, consult collaboratively with affected parties and interest groups, to
 ensure both technical excellence, and the building of commitment and support
- Develop and implement a system for regular review, so that steps toward progress can be monitored and adjusted for success.

Supportive Background

As his career evolved, Kurt Riegel's interests broadened and morphed by stages. They went from science, to science policy applied in the public interest, to environmental policy and technology development, to management of government organizations to achieve environmental compliance using best available technology, finally to local civic engagement applying his broad experience within the City of Annapolis and the County of Anna Arundel.

An important part of his past environmental work was coordinating organization line managers, each with their own mission, so they would take on environmental obligations as *also* core to their traditional missions. This required knowledge, skill, persuasion, diplomacy, and flexibility. It is not only possible to harmonize the traditional core missions of each organization with new environmental overlays, it is essential to success.

His strong current interest is on Annapolis city government, with which he has worked for years as a member of local government commissions and civic organizations to advance environmental progress for the city and in the region:

- He proposed, advocated, and achieved formal endorsement of a formal No Discharge Zone
 (NDZ) in local waters by the Annapolis Environmental Commission, the Severn River
 Association, the Anne Arundel Marine Industries Advisory Board, the Severn River
 Commission, and other watershed organizations. An NDZ would improve both marine water
 quality and the attractiveness of our area as a boating destination.
- As chairman of the Environmental Commission, consistently advocated and supported stronger
 protections for existing forests and trees in Annapolis, eventually resulting in adoption of a
 local ordinance implementing the state Forest Conservation Act
- Also supported and encouraged progress in energy efficiency, renewable energy, and general
 water quality improvements such as with remediation projects and compliance with Total
 Maximum Daily Load goals through Watershed Improvement Plans.
- He provided input to the existing Annapolis Bicycle Master Plan, advocated its implementation by the city, and has provided continuing encouragement with testimony before the Transportation Commission.

- He proposed to the then Mayor and worked with the Council for passage of a backyard chicken ordinance allowing hens, plus its reauthorization to eliminate a sunset clause
- He has given frequent testimony before the Annapolis City Council, its committees, and its boards and commissions, with supportive articles in the Capital Gazette newspaper, on a range of environmental and other public policy topics.
- As president of the Severn River Association, he was an early and effective advocate for instituting a new stormwater fee and for stormwater tax credit, since enacted into law. These were essential to creating a truly effective stormwater management system in AA County.
