






The John R. Elliott HERO Campaign for Designated Drivers<sup>®</sup> is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization dedicated to preventing drunk driving deaths and injuries by promoting the use of responsible designated drivers. The HERO Campaign was established by the family of Navy Ensign John R. Elliott of Egg Harbor Township, NJ, who was killed in a head-on collision with a drunk driver in July, 2000, two months after graduating from the United States Naval Academy.

## **Traffic Safety**

- Traffic Accidents
  - o 2022 to 2023 saw a 3.7% increase in traffic accidents
  - 2023 to 2024 (YTD) experiencing a 2.6% increase
- Pedestrians
  - o 2023 50 pedestrians were struck; 4 were killed
  - 2024 (YTD) 32 pedestrians were struck; 2 were killed
    - 36% decrease in pedestrians struck
- Traffic Enforcement
  - 2023 3,829 stops
  - 2024 3,956 stops
    - 3% increase in traffic stops




### <u>Administrative Charging Committee (ACC)</u>


- Case investigated by APD and forwarded to ACC

  - Created Inspections and Audits position in Professional Standards Division


### 2024 Sworn Staffing

- Another seven expected to resign or retire before the end of 2024
- Current staffing 115
