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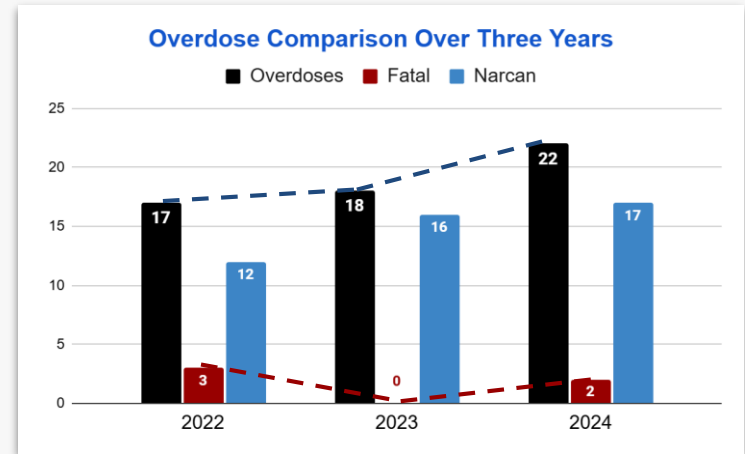
Overdose Data Review

Data is provided by APD and is the best available information as of February 11, 2025.

2024: Past Three Years (Ward 4)



- Fourth highest reported overdoses in Ward 4 since 2015
 - 2021 = 29 overdoses
 - 2019 = 28 overdoses
 - 2020 = 23 overdoses
 - 2024 = 22 overdoses
- Ward 4 reported the most overdoses in 2024
 - Ward 3 - 18 OD's
 - Ward 6 - 15 OD's
- Two fatal overdoses had been reported in Ward 4
- Narcan usage was reported to have been used in 77% of overdoses in Ward 4

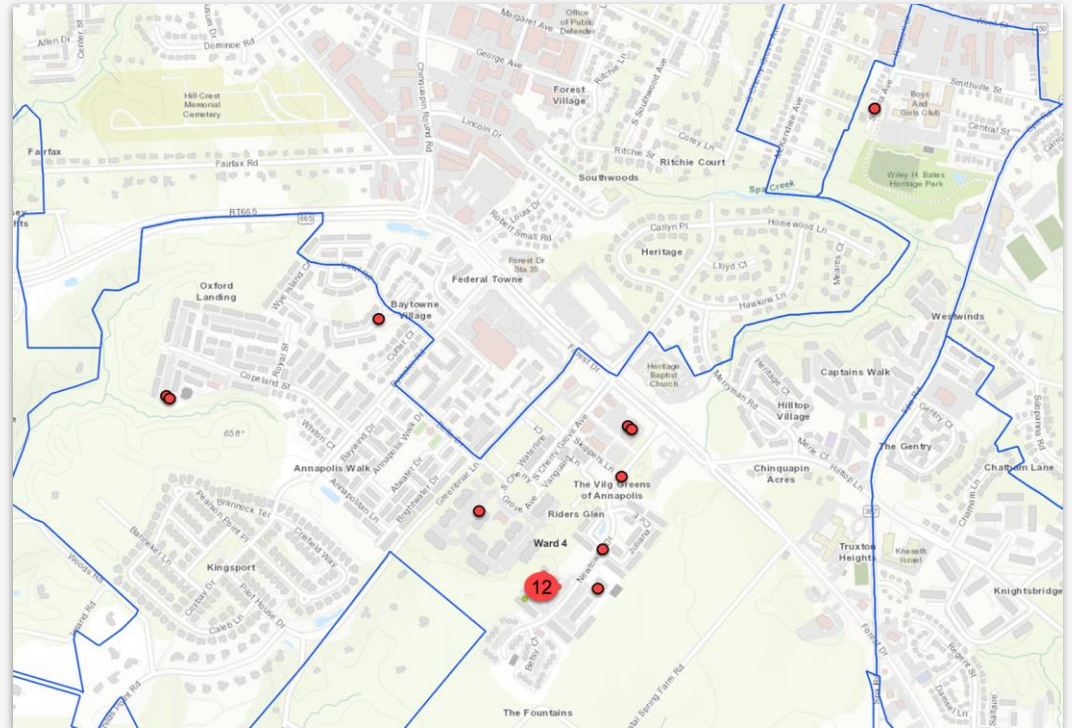


2024: Locations of Overdoses (Ward 4)

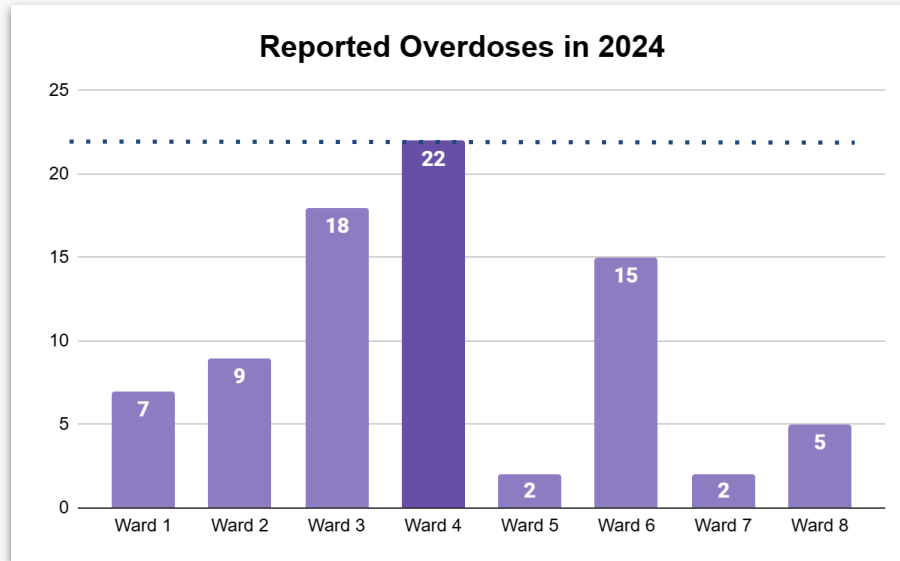

68% of Ward 4's overdoses are along Newtown Dr.



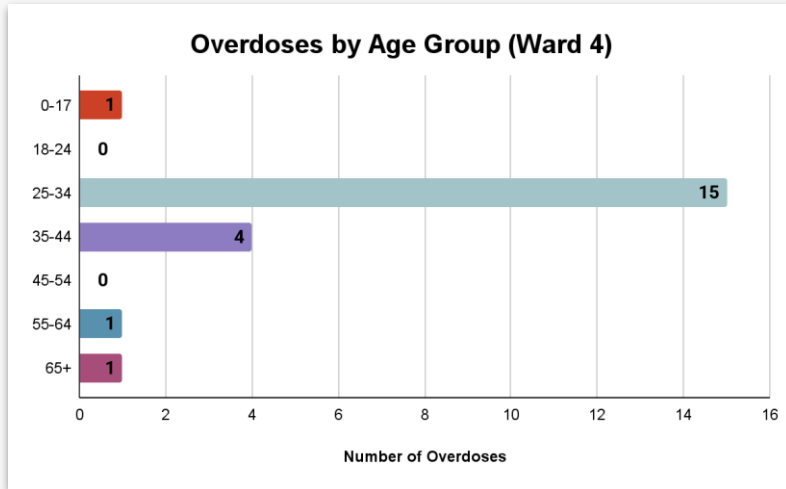
2024: Comparison by Ward



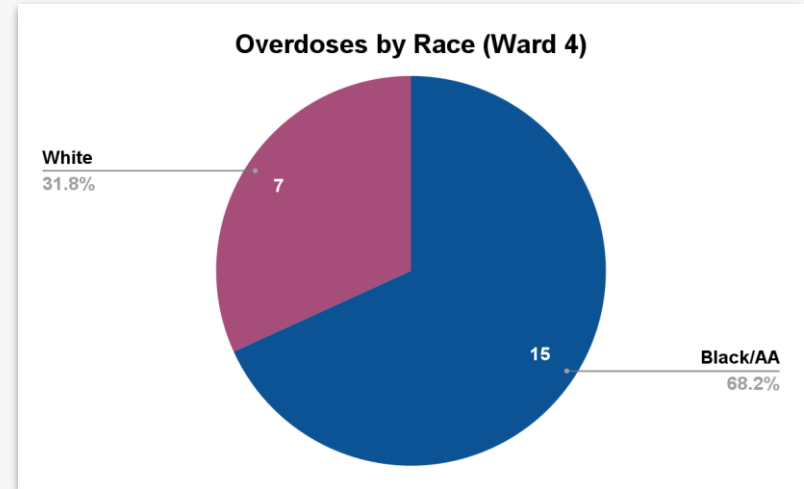
The City's average overdose per Ward in 2024 is 10.

2024: Demographics (Ward 4)

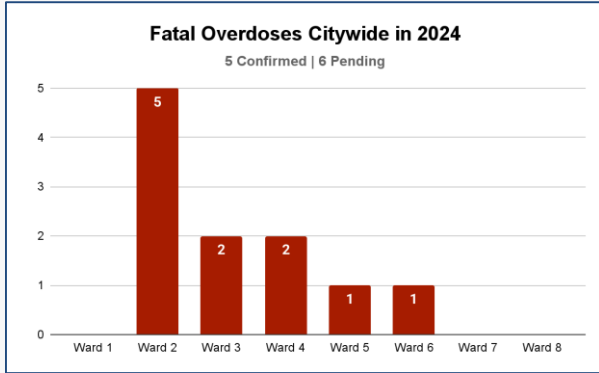


The age groups have maintained this spread for the past few years with the exception of 55+ where we have seen a drop in overdoses.



Black/AA still represent the largest group for overdoses. In 2024, 65% of all overdoses in the City where African American.

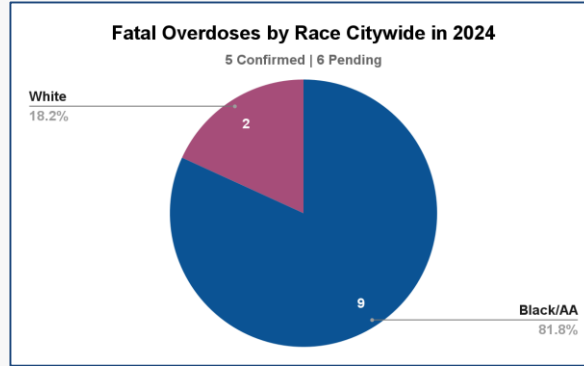
2024: Fatalities (Citywide & Ward 4)



WARD 4: Reported 2 fatal overdoses.

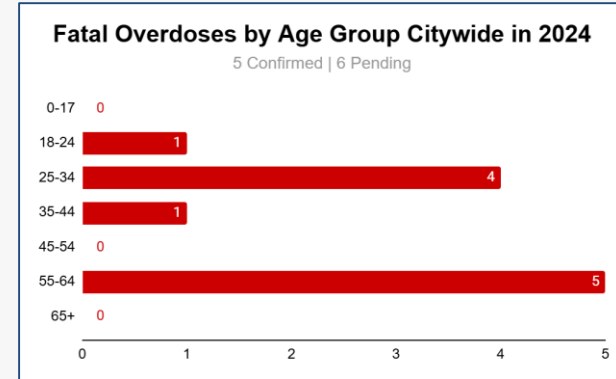
CITYWIDE: Reported the lowest number of fatal overdoses since 2018.

11 Fatal Overdoses Citywide for 2024.
5 Confirmed and 6 Pending



WARD 4: All fatal overdoses (2) were Black/AA

CITYWIDE: Black/AA represented the largest group for all fatal overdoses in 2024. However, in 2022 and 2023, the White population lead in fatal overdoses.



WARD 4: Both fatals were 25-34

CITYWIDE: Historically, the City saw more individuals overdosing in the 45+ age range, specifically Black/AA males.

Did You Know?

Did You Know: Narcan



- Naloxone is the active drug in Narcan
- Rapidly reverses opioid-related overdoses
- Only works for opioid overdoses
- Temporary; 30-90 minutes, max effective time frame
- Not a treatment for opioid use disorder
- Non addictive or habit forming

Because of its effectiveness and these facts, Narcan education and distribution continues to be a focal point for the City's Overdose Prevention Team.



Did You Know: Health-to-Go



- Eastport Health-to-Go vending machine has been a success and contain, for free:
 - KN95 masks, COVID-19 test kits, Xylazine & Fentanyl test strips, and Narcan
- Funded and maintained by the Health Department.
- First community-based location in the City and Anne Arundel County; Inventory can be customized to the needs of each location

Your Life Matters

- Hands-only CPR
- Narcan training
- Drug deactivation kits
- Supports Narcan leave behind, safe stations, and other community based events, etc.



APD's SUD

- Overdose follow ups
- Youth prevention programming in high risk areas
- Supports MedRx box, returning citizens program, Safe Stations, community based events, etc.



ODFree Annapolis

- City-specific data, resource hub, and dashboard
- Narcan training, test strip distribution
- Umbrella program for all City OPT programs.

Did You Know: APD SUD



- Annapolis Police Department's Substance Use Disorder Program (APD SUD)
 - Officers and civilian staff provide education to at-risk youth in “hotspot” areas
 - Officers and community liaisons or SUD specialists conduct follow-ups and provide resources to overdose victims
- Program coordinators are Officer Benson and Patti Norris

Did You Know: Your Life Matters (YLM)



- Annapolis Fire Department's Your Life Matters Program (YLM)
 - Focused on educating the community and preventing fatal overdoses
 - Has trained hundreds of community members, City employees, and business on Narcan administration, Good Samaritan Laws, and hands-only CPR
- Program coordinator is Lieutenant Kenneth White

Did You Know: NAM



- Annapolis Mayor's Office Naptown Anti-Dope Move[ment] Program (NAM)
 - Targets high-risk hotspots in minority populations
 - Hosts expungement events (court record cleanup, driver license issues, etc)
 - Hosts community engagement sessions, creates multimedia prevention campaigns, engages community leaders, etc.

Did You Know: ODFree



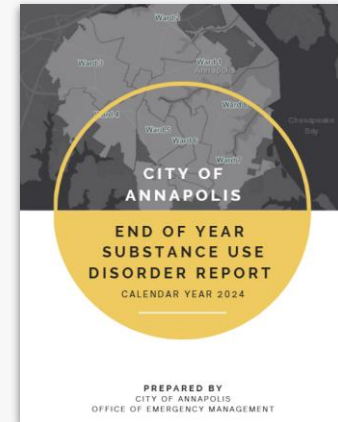
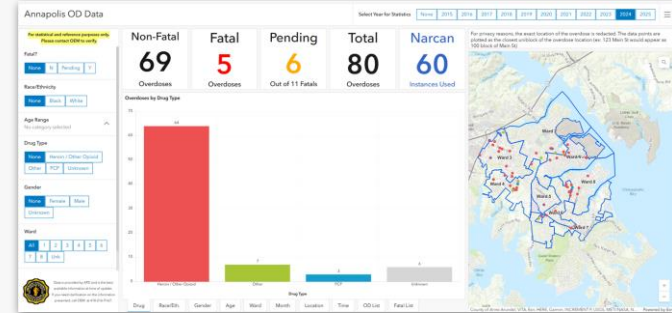
- Annapolis Office of Emergency Management Overdose Free Program (ODFree)

Food Friday Overview



- The Food Friday Program provides boxes of fresh and canned fruits and vegetables, frozen meat, rice, pasta and other non perishable foods to residents of Annapolis.
- Distributes approximately 275 boxes of food every week to support 840 Annapolitans facing food insecurity. Program is Volunteer run.
- Rec & Parks provides work space in the Pip Moyer Gymnasium.
- Food is provided by Anne Arundel Food Bank.
- Alderwoman O'Neill is volunteer program manager.
- OEM provides administrative oversight of the program.

- **Total Number of Food Boxes prepared for Ward 4: 28**

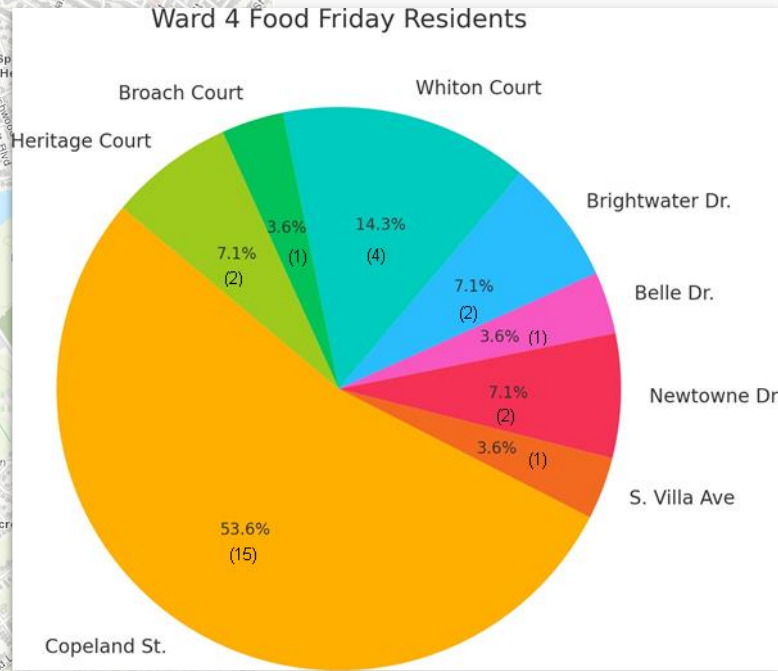
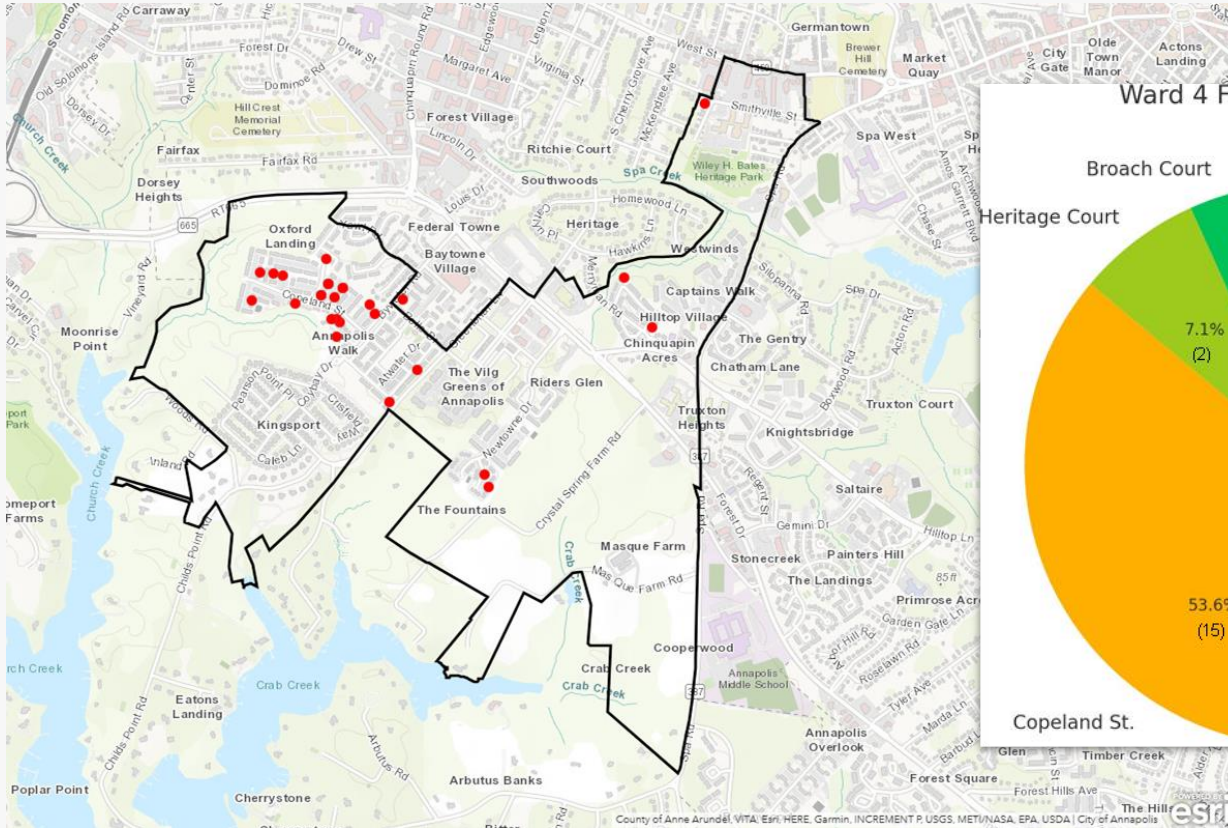
These Food Boxes Benefit:
